Technical Note:

The HHSC Quick Resource Guide is intended to help promotoras (community-based health workers) make appropriate referrals to health and human service agencies and partners of the Texas Health and Human Services Commission's Office of Border Affairs.

The Quick Resource Guide is not, however, designed for use in determining program eligibility. Categories listed in this book do not constitute all criteria used in the certification process, and eligibility is determined by each individual agency or organization.

The Quick Resource Guide was developed at the request of promotoras (community based – health workers) as a means of having agency and program information available to colonia residents. It has been found useful not just by promotoras, but also by community based organizations and agency staff.
